- Woodward wasn't much into the Watergate story. "I didn't have any great perspective on Watergate in those days, a story was a story," he said
- Woodward long ago said he was driven by insecurity
- Woodward once criticized those who covered the White House as stenographers. "There has been an obscene affection in Washington for the official version of the story," said at age 30. "Big name reporters were merely stenographers. Watergate has proved that is not enough."
